

Why this book is offered as interactive PDF.

Ebooks are ePub or MOBI files that are specifically built for ereaders. The text in these are reflowable, and redistribute to fill the screen. Readers of these files can adjust font size, typeface, and other viewing options. Just like a web page, ebooks are based on HTML. Ebooks do not have page numbers, so do not reference them in the text. Instead they indicate with references like, "in the next section/chapter/ or at the end of the book." These books cannot be printed by the user. Ebooks are seen as the best file option for something with a great amount of text on an ereader, like a Kindle, a Nook, a Kobo reader, a tablet, an iPod, a phone, etc. Because screens can be small, viewing a PDF requires readers to zoom and navigate to read the content, by manually moving the page from left to right to read it all. An ebook, with its reflowable text, provides a much better reading experience. Most major ebook retailers do not allow you to upload a PDF.

A PDF is not a true ebook. Yes, they are electronic, and so are often thought of as an electronic "book," but they are designed to display a hard print-type document that has a fixed layout. So, PDFs will retain the page design and look the same no matter what device you view them on, from a tiny phone to a tablet or computer screen, where as an ebook will scramble the design. For this reason PDFs are excellent where a precise graphic design is required that incorporates complex graphics, images and text. However, when viewing enlarged content you will need to scroll across the screen. Also, while PDF file sizes are higher, they retain the quality of higher resolution files, offer interactively, sound files and video. Both formats are constantly under development. The ability to print from a PDF file can be enabled. This PDF file is print enabled which means a printed copy can be made from the PDF file.





WAVE - light - sound - is a series of volumes that present the photographs taken by Lloyd Godman of musicians, and gigs. The title plays on waves in both sound and light. The publications not only present his photographs from the late 1970 period and then the Womad experiences, but the transition from film to digital photography. Godman became interested in photography at an early age and went on to establish the photograph section at the Dunedin Art School which he was head of for 20 years before moving to Melbourne and teaching photography at RMIT. His approach has always asked questions of the medium.

Rarefaction: is the reduction of an item's density, the opposite of compression. Like compression, which can travel in waves, rarefaction waves also exist in nature as in sound waves. A common rarefaction wave is the area of low relative pressure following a shock wave.

Refraction: This bending of light ray, at the surface of separation of two media is called refraction.

Reflection: 1. Reflection is when light bounces off an object. If the surface is smooth and shiny, like glass, water or polished metal, the light will reflect at the same angle as it hit the surface.

Introduction

The standard procedure at Womadelaide is for the sanctioned photographers to get 10 minutes at the start of each performance to get their shots and then they are ushered out of the fenced photographers area near the stage. This is one of the reasons I have never become a sanctioned photographer. It is interesting to witness how amateurish or uninformed many of these photographers are. Shooting with a wide array of digital cameras the taken shots often flash up on the LCD screen and reveal adequate but unexceptional shots.

There is special energy in a performance when the star builds the intensity during the act and then finally jumps the stage into the audience and gets it on in the moshpit with the audience. The security guards anxiety levels raises exponentially as they freak out an imagine the worse case disaster.

<u>Féfé</u> executed this with consulate style. But he was also switched on to the fact that if you want the most from it, then execute it close to someone with an expensive camera that seems to know what they are doing.

No band is ever on peak at the beginning of the set and the most powerful photo opportunities are probably going to open up towards the end of the show. This is what happened with Féfé, with 10 minutes before his set was to end he jumped the stage and headed straight for me. I suddenly realized I had to quickly change the long lens (100-400mm) to a wide angle 17 - 40 mm. Even so, the crowd pushed in closer to him and there was little space to frame the shots.

However it was a special opportunity and one that you make the most of.

Adam Page, is an amazing performer who can even extract meaning from the sounds that a microphone brushed through his luxurious beard makes. Using a loop he builds up sounds layer by layer and one is never quite sure what instrument or device will be used next to add the following layer

Kiwi band Rhombus offered a high energy performance with live projections by the acclaimed contemporary visual artist Michel Tuffery. Michel was one of the students at the art school where I taught for 20 years so it was great to catch up with him again. I loved the last stanza where the singer promoted the audience for applause with the promise that "if we come back next time to the big stage we will bring all the bros and cousins, and we will even cook for you".

As always Womad delivered the sounds and experiences of the planet.



















































Os Mutantes

Avant-garde pioneer Sergio Dias brings his legendary Brazilian psychedelic band to Australia for the first time. As founding members of the politically-charged 1960s Tropicália movement, the ironic and iconic Os Mutantes have become the new indie darlings since reforming and releasing their acclaimed 2009 album - their first recording in 35 years.

Os Mutantes (meaning the mutants; Brazilian Portuguese: are an influential Brazilian rock band that were linked with the Tropicália movement, a dissident musical movement during the Brazilian dictatorship of the late 1960s. They released their acclaimed self-titled debut album in 1968.

Although the original line-up (Rita Lee, Arnaldo Baptista and Sérgio Dias; and later with Liminha and Dinho Leme) made the most notable breakthrough for the group, it has gone through numerous personnel changes throughout its existence. After a hiatus from the late 1970s to the early 2000s, the band reunited in 2006, touring and recording new material.

Edition number: The archival prints are limited to an edition of three signed and numbered - once the edition is complete NO other prints are available. There is also one artist copy for exhibition purposes.

Paper: All prints are printed on high quality archival rag paper

Pigments: The finest Epson pigments are used for all prints

Size: The image is printed on A2 paper (420 x 594 mm 16.5 x 23.4 in) with a suitable paper boarder to allow for framing

Framing: While framing for wall mounting can be arranged it is easier to transport the print unframed and offer instructions on framing at your locality

Cost: The prints are offered at \$390 Au per print unframed plus postage and handling


Time: Depending upon demand, your location and the availability of the expert printer, expect 2-3 weeks for delivery.


